When he found out Juliet was dead, he killed himself. Friar Lawrence says, "Take thou this vial being then in bed And this distilled liquor drink thou off." (4.1.195). All of Friar Laurence's intentions were good but in this case, he should not have got involved. Friar Laurence contributed to the deaths, but Romeo and Juliet should also blame themselves.

Romeo and Juliet did not think their plans through and rushed their love. When they first met it was love at first sight for them both. This love story would have been perfect if their families were not in an ongoing feud. When they found out that their last names could never be associated together, they decided to not tell anyone. The only people who knew

were the nurse and Friar Lawrence. By simply speaking up they both would still be alive, and they could have possibly ended the feud. Friar Lawrence said, "where thou shalt live till we can find a time to blaze your marriage." (3.3.150). Also, when Romeo and Juliet first met, they wanted to be together right away, before even knowing each other they got married. If they just slowed down and really thought about what they were doing, this could have worked out way better. Also, they were only teenagers without much experience, this was almost bound to happen. Juliet states, "O Romeo, Romeo, Romeo! Wherefore art thou Romeo Deny thy father thy name." (2.2.40). Romeo and Juliet were not the only ones to

blame, Lord and Lady Capulet should also be held responsible.

Lord and Lady Capulet pushed the wedding on to Juliet, even after how bad she did not want it. Lady Capulet and Paris make a plan that Juliet will marry Paris. Her one true love was dead, and she cannot go back to her parents, they would either make her be with Paris or be mad that she was in love with a Montague. The only person she could turn to was the nurse, she got no support from anybody else. Lord Capulet says, "I tell thee what: get to Church on Thursday, or never look me in the face." (3.5.165). If Lord and Lady Capulet just stopped and listened to Juliet or at least tried to understand her no one would be dead, they are the most to blame for the deaths.

In conclusion, Friar Laurence, Romeo and Juliet, and Lord and Lady Capulet all contributed to the deaths of Romeo and Juliet. Friar Laurence's unorganized plan, Romeo

and Juliet rushing everything and Lord and Lady Capulet pushing the marriage was all too much to manage.
